




CAN System Overview

The Story in Numbers: PIT Results




On January 22, 2019, volunteers participating in Connecticut's Point-in-Time Count and identified 3,033 people experiencing homelessness.




The Story in Numbers: Annual Shelter Numbers

Our system has seen a 40% decline in homelessness since 2012.








CAN System Flow in FFY 2018 (Oct 2017 – Sep 2018)




Decrease in Homelessness Largely Due to Shelter Diversion
